We have now returned to face to face teaching and I would like to take the opportunity to praise all learners for their hard work and commitment during this period of remote learning. LATERAL FLOW TESTING IN SCHOOL

Lateral Flow Device testing's (LFD) single most important objective is to identify asymptomatic carriers of the Covid-19 virus. A small team of trained staff members have, during the past couple of weeks, successfully registered and completed almost 2,500 LFD's on our students and staff. A truly amazing effort by all. Thankfully not one positive test resulted! This means that, providing testing continues at the same levels in the home and everyone continues to adhere to the other measures such as the wearing of a face mask, the school will remain a safe place to learn.

Testing has now moved to the home and providing the school has received consent, students will have already received six tests and more will be issued prior to the Easter break. If you did not previously give consent for testing in school but wish to conduct tests at home, please let us know.






2 Hour walk to and back from South Norwood Lake (5.46 miles, 12,488 steps)

HOUSE COMPETITIONS

In addition to the Newsletter activities set by the PE department, there has also been the opportunity to take part in a whole school House PE Competition to gain House Points.

The 'Travel to Tokyo' event has required students (staff and families) to take part in physical activity by tracking their steps / distance and uploading to a leaderboard to contribute to the total house distance. Whilst travelling in house, teams participants have followed a virtual journey to Tokyo, exploring different cities around the world, discovering more about Japan and the Olympic Games.

As you can see, the current leaders are the Directors House, 25, 060Km away from Tokyo. So far, students at the school have logged a total of 286 sessions so far (8 March 2021) which is an impressive amount of physical activity and proves that our students value their physical activity.

CAREERS WEEK

Careers week was also promoted in PE lessons during the Month of March. Students were given access to various career related videos and links within their Google classrooms to explore careers related to the sport and physical activity industry. One video even included a personal account of an ex-student of Shirley High explaining her involvement in Circus performing, demonstrating the Shirley Value of Creativity!


Students will also notice the new careers notice boards relating to Physical Education in the Gym and teachers will continue to signpost careers during lessons upon return to school.

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PARENT GOVERNOR VACANCY

There is now a vacancy for 1 Parent Governor at the school. This vacancy is required to be filled by an election and you are invited to stand for election as a Parent Governor.

Parent Governors are elected from the parents / carers of students who are currently registered at the school and serve a four year term of office.

A governor of an academy is also a trustee, as the academy is a registered charity and a director as we are registered as a company with Companies House.

The Governing Body has three core strategic actions:

- Decision making and vision setting
- Accountability
- Driving up school and student performance

As a governor you will be required to attend a termly meeting of the Governing Body and a termly meeting of the Achievement Committee and make occasional visits to the school. You will also need to attend governor training sessions; these are free of charge and mostly take place in the evenings.

We currently have a particular need for governors who have expertise in marketing and legal /HR matters, and would be pleased if parents / carers with this experience stand for election. However, these skills are not exclusive and all eligible parents / carers regardless of skills and experience can stand for election.

However, there is an eligibility form to be signed and appointment as a governor will be subject to a satisfactory advanced DBS check.

Each person standing for election must prepare a short personal statement stating why they wish to stand for election. These statements will be circulated to parents / carers with the ballot papers. Each person will also need to sign the declaration of eligibility form, as we are committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, young people and vulnerable adults and expect all staff and volunteers to share this commitment.

The nomination and declaration of eligibility forms are available to download from the school website http://www.shirley.croydon.sch.uk . If you wish to nominate someone else, please check they are willing to be a School Governor. The completed forms must be returned to the school either clearly marked for the attention of the Clerk to Governors or by email to: morgans@shirley.croydon.sch.uk

The closing date for nominations is 12.00 noon on Wednesday 21 April 2021. If there is more than one nomination, a ballot will be held.




Geography Challenges!

UNIFORM REMINDERS

The standard of uniform on our return after lockdown has been good in the main. It has been a little more difficult with Hewitts being closed and students needing new uniform due to their growth during the lockdown. Please do let the Head of Year know if you have issues with uniform including if there is a delay in online ordering / delivery so we can help with lending the required items in the interim. It is important for our high standards of uniform to be maintained.

It is important however that our students understand that our uniform does not change when they leave through the gates at the end of the day! It is to be worn correctly and with pride for the school they represent until they get home and take it off. This includes jewellery, which is not permitted with our uniform – at any time!

As we approach the Easter break, please remember that any decisions made regarding extreme haircuts, extreme hair colours, piercings and nail extensions, must be rectified in time for the students to be presented according to our uniform rules on the first day of term of the Summer term.

Please be advised, particularly in the case of piercings that, irrespective of the timing of the piercing, students will not be permitted to cover them, but will be asked to remove them at school. Notes from home asking for permission for the piercings to remain in or be covered with plasters etc will not be accepted. I would therefore suggest that this two week break is not an ideal time to get new piercings, unless the student is prepared to remove them for school. The same principle applies for false eyelashes and coloured nail extensions which are not permitted in school, and I ask that you support us with this request to avoid the need for sanctions.



School skirts should be purchased from Hewitts and have either one or two front pleats only – no other style is permitted. There have also been issues with the permitted lengths so to clarify: skirt length should be on or about the knee. School trousers must be grey and be standard fitting school trousers. We do not allow black trousers. All students in Years 7 - 11 should be wearing a blazer.

Students in Years 7 – 10 should be wearing clip on ties only. The tie colours are; Year 7 gold, Year 8 light blue, Year 9 silver, Year 10 red and Year 11 green and they should be worn with our uniform to and from school.

Hair accessories (including headscarves worn for religious reasons only) must be navy, black, grey or white in colour only.

There are no major changes to our school uniform and if any item of school uniform needs replacing please purchase it from Hewitts - our uniform supplier. You can then be sure that the uniform purchased is both suitable and of the correct style for our school.

Please be advised that as from September 2021 our Year 11 students (currently Year 10) will be expected to wear a blazer as per the other Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 year groups.

ORGANISATION

Please can parents / carers ensure that all students have a fully stocked pencil case as well as the equipment they need for subjects such as Food Technology, PE, Dance etc.

All students must have a pencil case containing:

Pens (at the very least - 2 x black, 2 x green, 2 x red) Pencil (at the very least - 2 lead pencils) Rubber Pencil sharpener Ruler Glue



It is helpful for students to have a Math's set also as well as a small pair of paper scissors. Students must also have their student planner, a full bottle of water, a reading book and a clean face mask with them every day.

Being equipped and ready for lessons is very important and prevents the disruption of teaching and learning that occurs when a student does not have the right equipment with which to complete the lesson. We want to help get our students back on track with their learning and so disruption to this, caused by lack of equipment, is not acceptable.

Please also can you ensure that you see your child's student planner daily and sign it weekly. The planner is used as a weekly planner/diary as well as to communicate messages between home and school and record rewards and/or sanctions. The planner also contains information to assist our students with literacy, numeracy, learning skills and general information. Please take your time to familiarise yourself with the planner so that it can be used effectively as a source of information and as a means of communication between home and school. Students should have their planner with them every day.



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Attendance and Punctuality

I would like to thank parents/carers for their continued support with the attendance / engagement of their children during the lockdown and now on our return. We are pleased and proud of the resilience of our students and the fact that the school attendance / engagement has remained so good. It has been even more important because those students who have attended / engaged throughout, are the students who will have any education gaps closed more quickly. This in turn will set them back onto that path of success we want for each and every one of them. It is very important that going forwards our students continue to attend and engage with their face to face lessons and access remote learning if they need to be absent for Covid related reasons. Attendance at school became mandatory from 8 March 2021.

Please remember the following information currently in our Attendance & Punctuality Addendum:

Current legislation, and current guidance from the DfE:

- . Students are to self-isolate if they, or a member of their household, has symptoms or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19).
- Students who have symptoms should self-isolate and get a test.
- If a student tests negative and if they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to coronavirus (COVID-19), they can stop self-isolating and return to school. If the student remains unwell following the test (such as with a different illness), then they will be recorded as code I – illness in the attendance register, as would usually be the case. Code X will only be used up until the time of the negative test result.
- If a student tests positive, they should continue to self-isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of their symptoms. They should only return to school if they do not have symptoms other than a cough or loss of sense of smell or taste (anosmia). This is because a cough or anosmia can last for several weeks once the infection has gone. Code X will be used for the period of self-isolation until the test. After the student tests positive they will be recorded as code I (illness) until they are able to return to school.
- If someone in the student's household has symptoms, the household should self-isolate and the member of their household should get a test. If the member of the household tests negative, the student can stop self-isolating and can return to school. Code X will only be used up until the time of the negative test result when the student can return to school. If the household member tests positive, the student should continue self-isolating for the full 10 days from the day after contact with the individual who tested positive. Code X will be used during this period.
- Students may not have symptoms themselves but may be required to self-isolate if they are a close contact of someone with coronavirus (COVID-19). The NHS test and trace guidance states that a person should self-isolate for 10 days from the day after contact with the individual who tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19).
- In the event of a confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) case in the school community, advice will be provided on who this applies to, and the need to self-isolate for 10 days from the day after contact with the individual who tested positive. Code X will be used for these students during this period.
- As usual parents / carers should plan their holidays within school breaks and avoid seeking permission to take their children out of school during term time. Families should also consider that their child may need to self-isolate following trips overseas that require a period of quarantine. If a student is required to be in quarantine on arrival in, or return to the UK code X will be used in the register.
- If shielding has been advised nationally or in a local area by DHSC or PHE, then students who are clinically extremely vulnerable are advised not to attend school. Non attendance in accordance with guidance from PHE or the DHSC should be recorded as code X. When measures in the local area are lifted and shielding is paused again the expectation is that the student returns to school. Code X should not be used for sessions after the student has been advised to return to school.
- In all cases of self-isolation, parent/carers must inform the school immediately about the outcome of a test. Although we will not insist on evidence of negative test results or other medical evidence before welcoming students back after a period of self-isolation, it can be helpful for the school to have this for their records.

REMOTE EDUCATION:

If a student is not attending school due to circumstances related to coronavirus (COVID-19), we will immediately offer them access to remote education.

Students must attend live/remote sessions as they would normally do in respect of onsite lessons, unless there is a valid reason for their absence. We will keep a record of, and monitor engagement with this activity.

RULES RELATING TO MOBILE PHONES

Mobile phones are not permitted at Shirley High School – there have been no changes to this rule.

They are not permitted on our site and this was made clear to all parents/carers on the admission of their children to the school. With this in mind, we are not responsible for the loss or theft of mobile phones on our premises should students break our rules and bring them into school. Any student found in possession or using a mobile phone on our premises will receive an amber level incident (-3 house points) and have the phone confiscated.

SECURITY

We are currently not allowing visitors to the school unless they have been invited in for a scheduled meeting. It is important that if parents are attending for a meeting that they report directly to reception during school opening hours, so they can be signed in and the appropriate checks and sanitising undertaken. Out of hours, visitors must use the entry system either at the school front gate or in Reception so that a member of the site team can meet them and monitor who is on site. Students will challenge or alert school staff; and staff will challenge any unauthorised visitors or non-Shirley students on site and direct them as appropriate to Reception to be signed in.



Our Vision:

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To develop aspirational learners who strive for excellence academically, creatively and culturally, benefitting from a wide range of opportunities led by inspirational educators.

At Shirley High School we expect our students to achieve 96%+ attendance during each academic year. (This is the equivalent of 8 days off in the whole year).

We do not authorise any absence during the academic year unless a Student Absence Request Form has been completed and is accompanied by the evidence required e.g. an Order of Service for attendance at a funeral, details of when the flight was booked for unforeseen emergencies requiring overseas travel etc.

Research suggests that 20 missed school days a year i.e. 10% non-attendance = 1 GCSE grade drop in achievement. This is without the effects of the National Lockdown!

- 90% = 20 days absence (4 weeks) from school (September to July)

At Shirley High School we expect our students to have less than 3% lates in an academic year. (This is the equivalent of 6 late arrivals to school in the whole year.)

Punctuality to school is equally important and we are striving for all students to regularly attend school on time. Arriving to school on time sets our students up well for the day ahead as well as ensuring they access tutor time with their form tutors, which is where a lot of our pastoral work is undertaken. Poor punctuality has a detrimental effect on achievement as well as general organisation. Our whole school punctuality is generally good and we are proud of the way our students have coped with the disruptions to public transport, the fluctuations of the timings and accessibility of the buses as well as adapting their routines to ensure they arrive at school for their staggered starts.

- 5 Minutes late everyday = 3.4 school days missed per year
- 10 Minutes late everyday = 6.9 school days missed a year
- 15 Minutes late everyday = 10.3 school days missed a year
- 20 Minutes late everyday = 13.8 school days missed a year
- 30 Minutes late everyday = 20.7 school days a year

Thank you for supporting your children to attend regularly and on time. Please continue to support us and your child by ensuring their attendance remains above 96% and their punctuality remains less than 3% late, thereby allowing them to achieve their potential.

BEHAVIOUR

The majority of our students have maintained the high standards of behaviour expected at Shirley and have conducted themselves appropriately both in and out of school abiding by the new rules and regulations in place for maintaining a low risk Covid environment. The majority have also conducted themselves well during remote learning sessions.

We are committed to promoting a positive attitude towards our Golden Rule; 'Students are expected to show consideration and respect to all members of the school and local community at all times'. We will not tolerate any behaviour that disrupts the teaching and learning of our students or brings the good name of the school into disrepute.

Our students are aware of the Shirley Values and our expectation for them to consider and demonstrate them in their daily actions and behaviour.

We expect our students leaving school at the end of the day to make their way straight home, always respecting the public – pedestrian, motor, neighbours and local businesses. They should not go to the park or the park playground and they are expected to observe social distancing and wear their masks if travelling on public transport.

It is also really important that students use the zebra crossing rather than crossing in front of oncoming vehicles. Please can parents who drop their children off in the morning please park safely on the main road and not obstruct the zebra crossing or our neighbours' driveways. No parents / carers should drive into the school to drop students off unless a special arrangement has been made.

Student behaviour and our school uniform should not and must not change outside of school. We hold the same high expectations of our students in school and out. The reputation of our school is important and affects all of us. Students' behaviour on the way to and from school reflects on all of us. We do not want our students to behave in a way that will embarrass the school and bring the name of our school into disrepute.

Parents / carers' role in this cannot be underestimated and your support in helping us educate our children in regards to their behaviour is really appreciated.

The school's Behaviour Policy Addendum is available for reference on the school website and a copy of the school rules relating to; attendance and punctuality; general behaviour; the safe use of school premises; uniform; and prohibited and banned items is also available in the student planner.

OFF THE RECORD

Off The Record are a young person centred organisation offering counselling and emotional support. They have recently added a



new online counselling service to Off The Record's other support services (all detailed on the Off The Record website).

Whilst some young people may prefer face to face counselling there also a number of young people who find it difficult to engage with this type of support for a variety of reasons, including school refusers. When you register you will have contact within 48 hours and be starting to work with a counsellor within 5 working days.

The service is text based, via their secure website, so may not be suitable for those who find reading and writing too challenging or don't have access to a laptop or tablet. They believe passionately that the relationship between counsellor and client is central to the counselling that they offer and this is no different in their online service where young people work online with a counsellor in weekly sessions. All of their counsellors are qualified face-to-face counsellors who have undergone additional training to work effectively in the online environment.

LIVE STREAMING OF SEXUAL OFFENDING - CEOPS EDUCATION TEAM BRIEFING

As well as directing you to our new resources on Live Streaming #LiveSkills that can be used to educate children, young people, parents and carers about Live streaming, it was important that we address the behaviour of sharing images and videos of sexual abuse.

For professionals and parents finding out that images and videos of abuse are being circulated by young people and adults on social media, it can be a stressful time and difficult to know what course of action to take immediately. Here are some clear steps to take and important things to remember:

- Please never share a video or image depicting any kind of abuse involving children
- Each time a video or image of abuse is shared it re-victimises the child and increases the likelihood of blackmail, feelings of self-blame and powerlessness
- Report it to the platform it has been shared on e.g. YouTube, Facebook, Snapchat, Instagram etc
- Report it to CEOP if it is an image or video of sexual abuse involving a child with a link to where the video or image is hosted e.g. YouTube, Facebook.
- If it's not on a public platform and in only exists on a device i.e. Phone, tablet. Once reported, with authorisation of CEOP or the Police, delete it from the device it has been sent to (if offender usernames are visible make note of them)
- Encourage other people to report if it is being shared publicly.

If you work in a school or college and are concerned about what to do with peer to peer sharing of sexual images or videos you can refer to the 'Sexting in schools and colleges guidance'.

If a parent or carer is worried about a child seeing inappropriate things online, 'Thinkuknow/parents' has more information.

NATIONAL ONLINE SAFETY

There are more children handling digital devices than ever before and despite the happiness and entertainment they can bring, they can pose a number of dangers too. So, how can parents / carers protect their children? Here are our top tips for parents/carers:

Buying gifts

Take care when shopping online. Only use secure websites to avoid falling for scams. Before proceeding with an order, spend an extra two minutes to research the security of the product.

Security

Help your children to set up their accounts on their new devices and ensure their settings are set to private. Take the time to read the manual and get to grips with security and privacy options. We advise that you set up a 'two-factor authentication' process when logging in to an online service. Some toys and devices are fitted with web cameras – you can turn the remote viewing option off in the device's settings. In addition to this, remove any default location tracking and GPS settings on new devices.

Passwords

Some toys and devices have been found to have unencrypted Wi-Fi connections or unsecured Bluetooth connections. If this is the case, add a secure password or a PIN. Ensuring that passwords are secure is fundamental when protecting your children. When creating a password, remember to:

set up unique passwords for new accounts

avoid using easy-to-guess phrases such as 'freddie1'

change passwords and usernames on new devices from default

check your router has a strong password and latest security updates

Setting up parental controls

We advise that you set up parental controls for young and vulnerable children to help prevent them from viewing content or engaging in activities that they should not be. Additionally, take interest in your child's online activities. Play with them on their devices and encourage open conversation to help build that trust and confidence that will mean your child can confide in you if they ever feel uncomfortable, troubled, worried or unsafe.

Check age restrictions

Games and apps have age restrictions. It is important that you make yourself aware of these age restrictions and WHY they have these restrictions and make the decision whether it is appropriate for your child.

Be a role model

It's often the case that children copy the actions of their parents, carers and even siblings, therefore it is important to set good examples and be a positive role model that they can look up to.

Set boundaries

If you feel like your child is either spending too much time on their devices or maybe taking part in inappropriate activities, it is not a bad thing to be strict and set boundaries.
