Key Stage 3 Information

Students are taught Dance and Drama on a rotation in Years 7 and 8. There is a KS3 Drama Club and a KS3 Glee Club held every week with the opportunity to develop skills in acting, dance and singing. This club presents productions to parents/carers and students. Year 8 students are invited to audition for the SHS Theatre Company, who are the cast for our annual school production. Key Stage 3 students also have the opportunity to study for LAMDA exams with our peripatetic teacher. From January 2020 Key Stage 3 Dance club, who perform in house and other regional venues. Last year this included a performance at Silverstone at the Formula One British Grand Prix to 80,000 people.

KS3 students study music once a week, lessons include the chance to compose their own songs, perform and sing. Students can audition for the School Band or Rock Band; as well as study instruments of their choice with our fantastic peripatetic team.

Key Stage 4 Information

Drama, from Year 9, is an option subject leading to GCSE and A Level (AQA Specifications), with excellent results. Performance opportunities arise each term from year 7 to year 13, including GCSE, Btec & A level students. Students regularly perform the outstanding work they create to their peers and there is an opportunity for parents/carers and other students to see examined practical performances when they occur.

Dance is also offered as an option subject from Year 9, leading to GCSE in Years 10 and 11 and A Level Post 16 (AQA specifications). Lessons occur in a dance studio which boasts a fully sprung floor, mirrors and media resources. The courses include the theoretical study of professional works, performance training, choreography and safe dance practice.

Music GSCE (OCR specification), is also offered from Year 9. GCSE musicians study composition, Film Music, World Music and performance skills with a view to continuing their study at Post 16. Students study in well-equipped studios, practice facilities and are supported by instrumental specialists.

Key Stage 5 Information

BTEC Performing Arts was one of the first courses offered by the Shirley High Sixth Form and has led the way in post 16 excellence by attaining regularly outstanding results. More recently Drama A Level (AQA) and Dance A Level have been added to our provision and

both subjects have continued the trend of astonishing results. BTEC Music (Pearson) was introduced from September 2014 and this too has yielded 100% distinction results. Course details including exams, past papers and information about controlled assessment for each art can be found at the links provided below.

Peripatetic lessons

Lessons are priced depending on the student taking solo or shared lessons. Parents sign a contract agreeing to one academic year of lessons. The costs are based on 10 lessons per term in the following instruments: guitar; drums, singing; piano; clarinet; saxophone; trumpet; trombone & violin. Also offered is Lamda speech & drama lessons.

Solo lessons

10X30 minute lessons = £150

10X20 minute lessons = £100

Shared lessons (2 students at a time)

10X30 minute lessons = £80

10X20 minute lessons = £55

Extra-Curricular clubs

A wide provision of lunchtime and after hours clubs is provided by the Performing Arts department. All clubs are free to join:

- KS3 Drama club
- KS3 Glee Club
- Beats club
- School band
- Rock Band
- KS3 Dance club (from January 2020)

In addition, we have GCSE revision sessions, Set Dance rehearsals and the SHS Theatre Company. The aim of each of these activities is to provide a creative, vocational experience for the students, which will enrich their curriculum study and extend their learning. Many of the opportunities offered encourage students to work vertically with learners from other year groups, stretching the younger students and developing leadership and mentoring skills with those from older years. Peripatetic lessons are offered in a variety of instruments and also in LAMDA (speech and drama examination), these lessons lead to entry in external exams and support learners in their achievement in the curriculum lessons.

School Productions

Every year the Performing Arts department stages one major production, alternating between a play and a musical. Recent productions include: 'Grimm Tales', 'Guys & Dolls', 'A Christmas Carol', 'Little Shop of Horrors', 'Bugsy Malone', 'Macbeth' and 'Matilda'.

Other information

Homework is set by each class teacher. Depending on the module being studied the homework may take various forms, such as research, mini-projects or rehearsals. As each of the arts is creative, subject homework can vary from the schedule, depending on the creative work completed in lessons. Failure to complete homework by the deadline or to an acceptable standard will result in a detention of up to 45 minutes.

Gifted and talented students are identified through class assessment; these students are registered within the department and provided with opportunities outside the curriculum to stretch and develop their talents, as well as provided with extension activities within lessons.
